Corporal Isaac Stewart Eckford

Cpl. Isaac Stewart ECKFORD, son of Isaac **ECKFORD** and **Margaret Ann ROSS**, was born on 16 Mar 1919 on Zion Line, Renfrew, Ontario, Canada. Isaac was born in Westmeath Twp., and his wife Margaret was born in Ross Twp. She was the granddaughter of James Ross & Elizabeth Galley, pioneers in Ross Township from the early 1830's. Stewart was the 10th born of 12 children. One sister Eleanor died at 3 months old. The remaining 10 siblings lived into adulthood and included: Ross, Harold, Lindsay, Allan, Isabella (Mrs. Donald Robertson), Bertha (Mrs. Merril Kohlsmith), John, Nelson, Leah - Stewart's twin (Mrs. Alden May), and Clarence. They grew up on a farm on the Zion Line. Stewart's brother Nelson was a gunner in WWII with the Canadian Field Regiment.¹

Stewart Eckford enlisted in Ottawa on June 24, 1941 with the Cameron Highlanders; a couple months shy of 22 years of age. His enlistment papers indicate that he had acquired 8 years of public school but no high school; had

been working as a labourer on the farm as well as with Hydro Electric Commission in Calabogie. He was described as 5' $6\frac{1}{2}$ ", weighing 143 lbs. His complexion was medium with blue eyes and brown hair. He served at Cornwall, ON and Three Rivers, QC and was transferred to the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment, R.C.I.C., Army Service on May 13, 1943. He embarked for England on Dec 13, 1941. Stewart reported for duty at Ewshot, Hampshire, England on Dec 27, 1941 and served in the Mediterranean Theatre of War in the Sicily campaign before going to Italy. He was appointed Acting Corporal in September 1943.²

Corporal Stewart Eckford was killed on Dec 13, 1943, age 24, when he was struck by fragments of a shell at the Battle of the Moro River. He was temporarily buried near St. Vito, Italy.

Dear Mr. Eckford, This is one of those hard letters to write, but having gone through the same thing myself I thought a line might help.

Stewart was in a one-story building, while we were being shelled, when the accident happened. A shell hit the roof and a fragment caught him in the head. He lived a short time but never regained consciousness. We gave him morphine and rushed him to a hospital but to no avail. He nev-er knew what hit him and definitely did not suffer. This letter is inspired by my very

close regard for him as a man; and as a corporal I could always count on when things were tough.

Stewart had courage galore, never complained and was very popular in platoon. I appreciated him so much that he was in a line for pro-motion to sergeant, and his loss is irreplacable to all of us. He quietly did his job, giving all he the

had and inspiring the men under him. Words don't help much at a time like this, but please believe me when I tell you that we all miss him ter-ribly, and that we won't forget him in our further dealings with the hun. In closing accept this true account of his death. I believe all families do want to know details. Also accept my heartfelt sympathy and believe me when I say that Stewart has served as an inspiration to us all and you

honours in our Canadian cemetery at San Vito. Your son was regarded as a good and courageous soldier. His death is a loss to us all. In your grief I trust and pray you may know the comfort of Him Who said "I am the resurrection and the life".

In the future you will be proud to remember that your son died in the best of causes. His sacrifice will help to rid the world of war and make it a better place in which to live.

His remains were moved at a later date to the Moro **River Canadian War** Cemetery at Ortona, Provincia di Chieti, Abruzzo, Italy.^{2,5,6} His name is also engraved on his parents' gravestone at Zion Line Cemetery, Ross Twp.⁷

Corporal Eckford's name is also commemorated on The WWII Honor Roll, St. Andrew's United Church, Beachburg⁸; The Beachburg War Memorial⁹: The Westmeath War Memorial¹⁰; and The Pembroke War Memorial¹¹. The Campaign Medals he earned were the 1939-45 Star, Italy Star, Defence Medal, War Medal, and C.V.S. M. & Clasp.²


