

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
#### **Chapter One - Our English Roots**

#### Introduction

The Bennett surname originated from the medieval Roman given name Benedict (Latin Benedictus meaning 'blessed'). The name's popularity is attributed to St. Benedict (c480-550), who founded the Benedictine order of monks in Italy. It was initially used as a personal name and grew in frequency after the Crusades to the Holy Land in the 12th century when it became the

practice for returning soldiers or pilgrims to call their children after saints or prominent members of the early church. Personal names became surnames over the next two centuries, the first surnames being recorded in England<sup>1,2</sup>. The Bennett surname has also been derived from old French forms Beneit and Benoit which were popular among the Normans<sup>1,2</sup>.

There is no doubt that the Bennett family in Ross Township descends from ancestors in England. Our Bennett ancestors are documented as early as 1706 in the County of Cornwall which is located in the most south western part of England. It is bordered to the north and west by the Celtic Sea, to the south by the English Channel, and to the east by the County of Devon. Historically, tin and copper mines, china clay extraction, fishing and agriculture contributed to the Cornish economy<sup>3</sup>.




Pic 2: Map of Cornwall – St. Merryn

The parish of St. Merryn holds the records of our Bennett ancestors. The number of generations living there prior to 1706 is unknown, however at least four generations preceding our English immigrants are documented. St. Merryn is both a civil parish and a village<sup>4</sup>. The parish boasts more than 5 ½ miles of coastline, with some of the most dramatic cliffs and beautiful beaches in Cornwall<sup>5</sup>. The village is located in the parish approximately three and a half miles south of the fishing port of Padstow and approximately eleven miles north-east of the coastal resort of Newguay. It is built around a crossroads and has a post office, various shops, restaurants, public houses, and a petrol station with garage<sup>4</sup>.

Most villages in Cornwall have a 'Churchtown'. St. Merryn follows this historical pattern and her 'Churchtown' is located about six hundred yards east from the crossroads which marks the centre of St. Merryn village. It includes the church (Church of England), church hall, vicarage, old vicarage, cottages and the Cornish Arms public house<sup>4</sup>. In 2009, St. Merryn church celebrated its 750<sup>th</sup> anniversary. This author was in contact with a distant Bennett cousin, Pat Evans of New South Wales, Australia in the 1999. Pat had visited St. Merryn and provided pictures of the interior and exterior of the church. One of her photos included a Sunday School Roll that hangs

in the church. It is dated 1825 and includes the names of Bennett ancestors James Bennett and Jane Gregor.

The focus of this Bennett family document is an introduction to the James and Jane Bennett family of St. Merryn who immigrated to Canada over 165 years ago; their son George Bennett and his wife Fanny Johnston who lived in Ross Township; and a closer study of third generation Joseph Bennett and Margaret McLaughlin and their children's descendants.

#### **James Bennett's Origins**

Our first Bennett ancestor in Canada, **James Bennett**, <sup>6, 7</sup> was born about 1812 in St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England. <sup>8, 9, 10</sup> He was the seventh child of **William Bennett** <sup>6,9</sup> and **Elizabeth Brewer** <sup>6,9</sup> who had a family of 11 children. James was baptized on 14 Jan 1815 in Churchtown, St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England. <sup>11</sup>


James' father **William** was the son of **John Bennett** and **Grace W Retallick**. He was born in 1780 in St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England. He was baptized on 12 Mar 1780 in Churchtown, St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England. William died on 30 Nov 1866 in St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England<sup>6,9</sup> aged 86, and was buried on 2 Dec 1866 in the Churchyard. He was employed as a mason. The 1841<sup>12</sup>, 1851<sup>13</sup> and 1861<sup>14</sup> British census shows his residence to be Padstow, St. Columb Major, Co. Cornwall, England which as indicated earlier, was about three miles from St. Merryn.

James' mother **Elizabeth** was the daughter of **Francis Brewer**<sup>9</sup> and **Ann Trevathan.** She was born in 1780 in St. Ervan, Co. Cornwall, England.<sup>11</sup> She was christened on 13 Apr 1780 at St. Ervan, Co. Cornwall, England<sup>11</sup>. Elizabeth married William on 23 Apr 1803 at St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England.<sup>11</sup> She died on 2 Apr 1861 in St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England aged 80, and was buried on 6 Apr 1861 in the Churchyard<sup>11</sup>.


James' siblings' first names were Grace, John, Charlotte, Ann, William, Greshom, Thomas, Mary, Jane and Richard. In researching James' siblings, no information has been found that indicates any of the siblings left England. However descendants of a brother Thomas settled in Australia. This is the connection to Pat Evans. Another descendant of his brother Thomas came to Canada. Earl and Fay Bennett met Jean Gillings, a descendant of this line from Southern Ontario. Interestingly, there was a Trevathan family who immigrated to Hastings County from St. Merryn. Further research is needed to determine if there is a connection, however one would think that families from a small area would likely know each other. It would be an interesting investigation to identify other St. Merryn families in Renfrew and Hastings Counties.

#### Jane Griggor's Origins

Jane (Griggor) Gregor<sup>6,9</sup> was born about 1815 in St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England.<sup>6,9</sup> She was the seventh child of **Henry Gregor** and **Jane Jenefer Brenton** who had a family of eight children.<sup>6,9</sup> Jane was baptized on 26 Dec 1815 in Churchtown, St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England.<sup>11</sup>

Jane's father **Henry Gregor** <sup>6,9</sup> was the son of **William Gregor** and **Rebecca Brabin.** He was born on 1 May 1785 in St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England <sup>11</sup> and died in Jan 1856 in St. Merry, Co. Cornwall, England <sup>6,9</sup> aged 70. According to the 1841 Census <sup>12</sup>, Henry was an agricultural labourer. The known residences of Henry were within St. Merryn Parish. The spelling of the Gregor surname has also been noted as Griggor, Greggor, and Grigger. The Parish and Census records usually spelled the name as Gregor.

Jane's mother **Jane Jenefer Brenton**, daughter of **Henry Brenton** and **Frances Old**, was born on 16 May 1784 in St. Merryn, Co. Cornwall, England. She died on 2 Jun 1826 in St. Merryn, Co., Cornwall, England aged 42, and was buried on 5 Jun 1826 in Churchtown, St Merryn, Cornwall, England.

Jane's siblings' names were Philip, John, Thomas, Henry, Mary, William and Richard. Her father married a second time and she had two sisters Nancy and Betsy. In researching Jane's siblings, no information has been found that indicates any of the siblings left England. A three generation Pedigree Chart for Jane Gregor is provided on page 8. A Descendant Chart for her parents is on page 9.

There is evidence that James & Jane corresponded with their siblings in England. The following is a transcription of a letter written to James and Jane Bennett from Jane's brothers Wm and Richard Greggor. An attempt to keep the spacing, spelling and punctuation has been made during transcription. There are several folds where the paper has split and been taped which creates some difficulty in the transcription. Keep in mind that this letter is written by two brothers which will help in the understanding of the family updates given. The original letter is in the possession of Merrill Wallace<sup>15</sup>.

#### St. Merryn Feby 21 1864


My Dear Brother and Sister and family I was glad after a long period of time to receive a kind and loving letter from you also to find that you are all getting on so well. Now I find you wish to know the best means of getting over your Money I have been to Wadebridge seen Mr. Coleave the trustee he says that you must send home to Me What township and the bank you will have it sent to and I will deliver it to him and he will forward it immeadiently and I shall send on the order to you in a letter I have also endeavoured to send you as to the family affairs as to who is living and so on First Jameses Father is still alive but very feeble his Mother been dead 3 or four years Jane still lives home with the old Man Gershon died about 6 months since John and family is all well. Thomas and family is all well lost his oldest daughter Grace and family is all well Bate and family the same had the second son married vesterday to John Olds daughter the Shoemaker Now I believe I have mentioned all Jameses own family the all desired to return their best respects to you and wish you health & happiness As to our family I first begin with Brother John there is about 10 Children 3 of which is Married the live St. Minver all well we seen them about a week since Thomas and family is all well still live in St. Allin No more family. Henry and family is all well Live down in the parish of Feock all well Mary is in a dropsical state of health I fear it will end bad as to the rest of the family the are all well William and family is all well Susan is intending to send a small Valentine if we have room to her Cousin Mary Ann I have 5 no more than when you heard from me last Richard and family is all well We have 6 Children and I do not know that we have finished as yet. Joseph Griggor is dead he was Captin of a vessel died in Newport sudden left a wife and two children became 6illiam6 to Padstow Parish (page two) Betsy Griggor is still living with Mr. Hawkin Polmark Eliza is married to a shoemaker residing in Padstow James is in service and Martha is home to Shop with her 6illiam6her Hanna Salter still living

as to your uncles and ants uncle Henry Brenton is still living all well ant Betty is dead, he married Eliza last Thursday Joseph and family is all well 9 Children, 4 Married Henry and family is all well 5 children. Mary and family is in Ireland Betsy and family is in America both dead left several Children we do not hear from them Ant Fanny Moscumb and uncle Henry is still living with Elias and Mary the ware Millers at Porneten Mill near Wadbridge gave her best respects to you. Uncle John and ant Jane Brenton is all well still keeping the Publick House to Churchtown Uncle Richard and family is all well with the exception of Jane Blythe the oldest daughter She is left a widow with 8 children he was a Captin doing very well She has salireys from Q (?or2) or the Clubs Fany Bray and Richard is very well as to the rest of Ant Salleys Maidens the has turned out bad the have 7 Base Children between the two one has 3 and the other 4 and Henry Martyn is somewere in the West knocking about you say you never heard from none of the Frenbaths family and about the Spoons I do not know the directions the are some ware about Coburg I think the young William lives in Port Hope the young Stephen Ivey is home from America stoping at Towan with his Brother ?Las thinking of going out this spring I was thinking of sending out a letter by him to see what became of them We hear that uncle 7illiam Frenbath is dead a few months since, I have to say that Luke Bennett and John Tremonth sends their kindest respects as we all of us join in with Brotherly love and wish you every Comfort that this World can afford you. So as soon as you receive this I wish you to forward a answer ameidently I Received the Newspaper as you wish to know all right So We Remain your affectionately Brothers Wm & Richard Greggor To James and Jane Bennett


